We find in the last Hillsborough *Recorder*, a letter from Capt. James W. Wilson, of Alamance, from which we make the following extract:

"In the *Standard* I notice a letter from Capt. York, which does not give justice to the company from the Hawfields, which I have the pleasure to command; and I write to-day to ask you in your next editorial to make a statement for them. In addition to the two companies that charged upon Sherman's battery, under their brave commanders, Capt. Avery and Kirkland, the writer neglects to add the one from Hawfields. This company fought bravely through the entire battle, was in the charge upon the battery, and even went beyond it, and at night as large a proportion as from any other company followed in the pursuit. I can say this without any egotism, as the company was under the command of my most efficient first Lieut. Carter."

We are satisfied that Capt. York did not intend to do the slightest injustice to the Hawfields company. He had left a blank in his letter, after mentioning several companies, hoping no doubt before he closed his letter, to obtain the names of the other companies that charged upon the battery. In publishing the letter we closed up this blank.

Capt. Wilson has returned home on leave, on account of serious indisposition—hemorrhage of the lungs. We hope soon to hear of his restoration to health. He is every way worthy of the men under his command, who bore so gallant a part in the great battle which laid permanently the foundations of Southern independence.
